Hotspot Distribution

- Logistics still to be finalized with target rollout by 2020-2021 school year
- City will continue to work with SCCOE to coordinate with schools regarding student household need for connectivity, distribution, and use
- Offers opportunity to respond quickly to meet the needs of students
- Additional hotspots may be distributed to high needs non-student households
- Staff to develop continuity plan for families after first year of service
