RECOMMENDATION

Adopt the 2021 Legislative Program and the top legislative priorities for 2021.

OUTCOME

The 2021 Legislative Program and the top legislative priorities will guide the advocacy work in the State and Federal 2021-2022 legislative session.

BACKGROUND

The California Legislature and the United States Congress convene in two-year legislative sessions. 2021 will be the first year in the 2021-2022 legislative session for both the California Legislature and United States Congress. The Legislative Program and the top legislative priorities direct the City's work around legislation and regulation throughout the year. The Administration is bringing forward an update prior to the beginning of the next legislative session to reflect current policy windows and Council direction during 2020.

ANALYSIS

The Administration recognizes that policy windows in Sacramento and Washington D.C. often open quickly and unexpectedly. The 2021 Legislative Program contains general policy direction that will allow the Administration to take advantage of policy windows and advance the Council's legislative and regulatory agenda. Given the focus on COVID-19 pandemic response and mitigation for the organization, the Administration is proposing to focus on pandemic related response and recovery activities and to deemphasize proactive policy work in other policy areas. The proposed 2021 Legislative Program can be found in Attachment A. Highlighted text indicates new policies in the program. The Administration has also reviewed and updated existing legislative program items to reflect the current policy landscape and Council direction from 2020. The Citywide top legislative priorities are listed below. The priorities fall under a broad federal and state policy focus of COVID-19 response and mitigation.

2021 Top Legislative and Regulatory Priorities

COVID-19 Response and Mitigation (Federal and State): Advocate for resources and policies to protect the health, safety, and economic viability of residents and businesses in San José, including testing, food, and isolation support for the City's most vulnerable populations.

- Advocate for direct, flexible funding for local governments to respond to and mitigate the impacts of COVID-19.
- Advocate for planning, outreach, response, and recovery measures to support populations with access and functional needs.
- Support emergency temporary and interim housing solutions so that people can shelterin-place to reduce the risk of the spread of COVID-19.
- Support residential and commercial eviction moratoriums related to COVID-19 impacts.
- Support local government flexibility in regulations, program implementation, and processes that are needed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Under the current internal process for taking positions on legislation, the Administration has authority to take policy positions that align with the Council-adopted Legislative Program. Throughout the year, the Council can amend or add Legislative Program items by bringing a memo to the Rules and Open Government Committee for referral to the full Council.

CONCLUSION

The Administration is bringing forward the 2021 Legislative Program for Council adoption. The Administration will continue to actively engage legislators in support of the Legislative Program and the City's top legislative and regulatory priorities in 2021.

EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

Every year policy windows open with new opportunities for engagement. As these opportunities occur, the Administration will bring to Council any legislative or regulatory items that align with the Council-Adopted Legislative Guiding Principles, but are not covered in the 2021 Legislative Program. The Administration will also provide regular updates to Council on actions taken on legislation.

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CLIMATE SMART SAN JOSE

The recommendation in this memo aligns with one or more Climate Smart San José energy, water, or mobility goals.

PUBLIC OUTREACH

This memorandum will be posted on the City's Council Agenda website for the November 17, 2020 Council Meeting.

COORDINATION

The Administration coordinated this memo with the City's state and federal legislative advocates; the City Attorney's Office; City Clerk's Office; City Manager's Budget Office; the Office of Economic Development; the Airport; and the Departments of Community Energy; Environmental Services; Finance; Fire; Housing; Information Technology; Library; Parks, Recreation, and Neighborhood Services; Public Works; Planning, Building, and Code Enforcement; Police; and Transportation.

Planning, Building, Code Enforcement	Electronic Cigarettes and Flavored Tobacco: Support state and federal legislation to prohibit the sale of e-cigarettes and flavored tobacco products.
Police	Hate Crimes: Support legislation that would address ongoing safety concerns and help prevent acts of violence motivated by hate, including improving data collection and reporting. Expand California's "criminal threat" statute (Penal Code 422(a)) to include mass shooting-related threats.
Police	Porch Theft: Support legislation that would make entering the curtilage of a residence with the intent to commit theft of a package delivered through the mail or through a public or private carrier a violation of the law and subject to punishment for burglary.

Support legislation and regulations that increase the transparency and predictability of the PCIA over time through legislation or Phase 2 of the PCIA proceeding. Support proposals, including the federal surface transportation authorization legislation , that provide funding, support, or local discretion for municipal governments to implement traffic safety programs and initiatives consistent with Vision Zero. This includes the ability to utilize Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) tools and establish speed limits based on context sensitive methods aimed at protecting vulnerable roadway users, such as pedestrians, bicyclists, children, and seniors. Support legislation and funding that provides additional opportunities to develop or improve rail infrastructure in San José. Support efforts to advance and secure additional funds for BART Phase 2 as needed. Identify and secure funding for Diridon Station planning and construction efforts. Support Caltrain electrification and modernization efforts. Work closely with High-Speed Rail stakeholders to support infrastructure and right-of-way

Continue to work with state agencies as regulations are implemented. Support regulations and legislation that provides travel data from transportation companies for land-use planning, traffic management, and operational purposes. Encourage the development of inclusive mobility options that can provide equitable and accessible transit options for all of San José's residents.
