
Evaluate revenue generating programs and increase scholarship assistance programs

EA5b. Expand and market the scholarship program to increase donations to meet growing needs.


Revenue and Pricing Policy 1-21

Subsidy Category	Level of Community or Individual Benefit	Current	Under Review
Public	Highest level of community benefit and subsidy. No fee.	Trails, neighborhood parks, and senior nutrition program.	Include recreational swim, Teen Center memberships.
Merit	Cost-sharing model between fee and subsidy. Maintain a fee and increase scholarship opportunity up to 100% where possible.	Swim lessons, active adult enrichment, and therapeutic classes.	Includes San Jose Recreation Preschool, R.O.C.K., swim lessons, youth enrichment classes (PRNS Leisure), full day camps
Private	Minimal to no subsidy due to individual/private benefit.	Preschool, R.O.C.K. afterschool, leisure classes, rental for private parties, fitness memberships, and golf.	Rentals, fitness, golf, and destinations such as Happy Hollow.



Fees and Charges Revenue


Scholarship Utilization by Zip code - 2020
