

- Evacuation Center opened












Shelter & Hotel Capacity Update

- 1,696 permanently housed since March 2020

Goal 4. Immediately expand emergency relief and exercise the Defense Production Act.


Goal 5. Safely reopen schools, businesses, and travel while protecting workers.

President Biden's COVID Executive Orders

- National mask rule in Federal facilities and transportation systems
- Creation of a Health Equity Task Force
- Safe Travel directs the implementation of COVID testing for any person arriving from a foreign country
- Extend eviction and foreclosure moratorium
- Extend student loan forbearance
- COVID supply chain use Defense Production Act on PPE and vaccine supplies.
- Up to 100% FEMA reimbursement to reopen schools, non-congregate shelters, childcare facilities, and National Guard deployment for the pandemic
- Expand Food Assistance
- Improve COVID data collection and transparency




Notable Provisions

- Focus on hard-to-reach and high-risk populations.
- Reimburse states and local government for vaccine expenses.

Federal and State Advocacy

2021 Legislative Program Policy

- Ensure those first in line to suffer the effects of the pandemic are not last in line for the vaccine
- Prioritize communities with the highest rates of infections, death, and residents who perform essential, in-person work
