I have been a resident of Almaden Valley for over 30 years. We have seen much growth and most of it positive. However, there has been increasing overcrowding and, in recent years, we have experienced power outages, traffic snarls just to go to the nearby grocery store, inability to pull out of the driveway in a residential street because of the level of traffic (again, a small residential street), parking difficulties at the doctors office, hospital, grocery store etc., water shortages and the increasing cost of electric, garbage and water bills which are becoming prohibitive!

If more housing in the form of multi-family and multi-plexus occurs, what is the plan for the power infrastructure?! Our systems can't handle the load now! What will happen with 4 times the load - 4 times the ranges, AC, and stoves. These are the larger residential loads. And with all new residential construction having no natural gas that means all water heaters and heating will be electric.

San Jose cannot withstand further growth, just to put more money in the pockets of rich developers and corporations who are not invested the well being of the city or its residents.

We are opposed to the elimination of single family home zoning, with 4-plexes + 2 ADUs by right, we are in favor of keeping the original 2040 General Plan building density near rail transit hubs, urban villages and near down town per the plan.

Subject: State Approves Relief Measures for Tenants and Landlords

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

This pandemic has impacted both landlords and tenants across California in their ability to meet their financial obligations. To aid both tenants and landlords, the State Legislature, this week, took early action to extend the eviction moratorium through June 30, 2021 and distribute \$2.6 billion of the latest federal stimulus dollars to cover unpaid rent.

According to a PolicyLink report, in Santa Clara County alone, 37,305 households owe an estimated \$173.5 million in "back rent" (or unpaid rent). Of those households, 22,269 are low-income. When back rent is eventually due, tens of thousands of families will be faced with evictions and crippling debt while, at the same time, landlords will see severe financial hits and cashflow challenges.

While it is imperative that we take action immediately to get federal relief money out the door to protect our most vulnerable, to avoid crushing debt and mass evictions, we also need in place a backstop through tenant-landlord mediation to ensure tenants or landlords that don't receive adequate funding don't fall through the cracks.

This is why I have been pushing for, as part of this equation, increased tenant-landlord mediation services. A lifeline to both landlords and tenants, mediation is necessary to bring parties together and resolve contentious situations. To this end, I'd like to thank my colleagues on the Senate Budget Committee and Chair, Senator Nancy Skinner for moving forward with my idea for a statewide multilingual call-center to answer questions and provide direct technical support to landlord and tenants over the phone to help ensure that no one goes unhoused. For those landlords and tenants that lack internet access, this call center will be essential in helping them access the services they may need.



<u>Update on COVID-19 Cases, Hospitalizations, and Vaccination Efforts in Santa</u> <u>Clara County</u>

As I mentioned in a previous Newsletter, the California Department of Public Health, this past week, <u>made the decision</u> to return the state to its tier system that will allow for the expansion of our businesses and activities with safety precautions in place in Santa Clara County, including limited service of our personal care services, outdoor operations of gyms and fitness centers, and outdoor dining. Learn more about what is open in our County at <u>this link</u>.

The County of Santa Clara Public Health Department announced 191 new deaths from COVID-19 last week, bringing the total number of deaths to 1,395 in Santa Clara County as of January 30th, 2021. The total case count has now reached 101,453 with a 7-day rolling average of new cases (based on specimen collection date) at 722 cases per day.

As of January 30th, there were 479 COVID positive patients hospitalized in Santa Clara County (down from 585 the prior week and 638 the week before that) with 129 patients in the ICU. COVID positive patients now occupy 37% of all ICU beds, and just 14% of beds are currently available. These ICU bed capacity numbers already factor in surge beds that are staffed. More data can be found through the Santa Clara County Public Health Department's **Data Dashboards**.

The County's **COVID-19 Vaccine Dashboard** is updated daily with information about vaccine allocation and administration by healthcare providers throughout the county. that your official and most up-to-date source of vaccine-related information in Santa Clara County is **sccfreevax.org**.

Santa Clara Valley Medical Center continues to offer free drop-in and appointment-based COVID-19 testing at several locations across the county. Residents can book an appointment for various sites in <u>Vietnamese</u>, <u>Chinese</u>, <u>Spanish</u>, or <u>English</u>. 

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SHARKS FOUNDATION, SAP TO PROVIDE \$500,000 GRANT TO FUND AND LAUNCH CITYTEAM'S ALAMEDA COUNTY MOBILE FOOD PANTRY EXPANSION PROJECT

FUNDS WILL PROVIDE FOOD BI-MONTHLY TO 18 TOTAL SITES IN ALAMEDA COUNTY,
AN EXTENSION OF THE FOOD DISTRIBUTION MODEL ALREADY USED IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY

SAN JOSE (February 4, 2021) – The Sharks Foundation (@SJSCommunity) and SAP (@SAP_BayArea) have partnered to provide a \$500,000 grant to local non-profit organization CityTeam (@CityTeam) to fund and launch the Alameda County Mobile Food Pantry Expansion Project. The project, an extension of CityTeam's current model that establishes food distribution locations in underserved neighborhoods throughout Santa Clara County, will strategically select 18 different sites across Alameda County to provide disadvantaged community members with fresh and accessible groceries on a bi-monthly basis. The multi-year partnership begins now and will continue through the 2022-23 NHL Hockey Season.

"We are honored to partner with SAP and CityTeam on this vital and timely expansion in support of those in greatest need in our community," said Heather Hooper, Director of Community Relations & the Sharks Foundation."

To expand into the East Bay, CityTeam will partner with Alameda County Community Food Bank to identify sites across Alameda County that represent those with the greatest need. Food for the mobile pantry will also be sourced through ACCFB. As part of the Sharks Foundation and SAP grant, funds will be used to purchase a new refrigerated box truck and to cover labor expenses required to make deliveries possible. In years two and three of the partnership, funding will allow CityTeam to launch additional projects in tandem with the food pantries including a Community Clothing Program and addressing the digital divide by providing access to technology for some residents.

"Families throughout the Bay Area are in real need of safe and reliable ways to get quality food on their tables," said Anamarie Franc, Chief Operating Officer, SAP Bay Area. "At SAP, we believe in the power of partnership and are proud to work with CityTeam on the innovative Mobile Food Pantry that brings food to communities so that nobody seeking support goes hungry. We've seen this program succeed in Santa Clara County and know it will have a big impact in Alameda County."

As part of its five-year strategic plan to help end hunger in Silicon Valley, CityTeam has been eager to expand its mobile food distribution model into Alameda County and to close the gap in households with unmet needs. As reported by the Alameda County Community Food Bank and Urban Institute in November of 2019, 1 in 5 Alameda County residents' experiences or is at risk of hunger – a ratio which has grown to at least 1 in 4 due to the pandemic.

"When I came to CityTeam four years ago, we made a strategic decision to increase our focus on families struggling to make ends meet. We could not be more excited about the opportunity to fulfill that promise even further, thanks to support from the Sharks Foundation, SAP, and the Alameda County Community Food Bank. Together, we can now help even more moms, dads, kids, and seniors, in our community. This innovative partnership enables us to provide nutritious food, as well as relief and hope during a time when family budgets are stretched past their limits," added Glen Peterson, CityTeam President and CEO.

Later this year, representatives and volunteers from the Sharks Foundation, SAP, and CityTeam will meet in Alameda County to distribute food to community members in need. Details will be announced later.

The \$500,000 grant for the Alameda County Mobile Food Pantry Expansion Project represents a growing partnership between the Sharks Foundation, SAP and CityTeam. In 2020, the Sharks Foundation and SAP provided a \$34,000 Community Assist Grant to sponsor CityTeam's Santee Neighborhood Mobile Food Pantry at Esperanza Middle School for an entire year. The partnership allowed for more than 9,500 lbs. of food, which included grocery dry goods, fresh fruit, vegetables, meat, and dairy products (made possible through a partnership with Second Harvest of Silicon Valley), to be provided to 150-200 underserved families on a biweekly basis. Additionally, the Sharks Foundation and SAP helped fund CityTeam's December Holiday Gift and Grocery Card Giving Event this past December.
