#### Project Concurrent Review

- Concurrent review allows certain types of permits and environmental findings for the <u>same site</u> to be reviewed and acted upon by the highest decision-making body in one act
- Proposed amendments would:
  - Add Historic Preservation Permits and Historic Preservation Permit Amendments to the list of development permits currently eligible for concurrent review process
  - ➤ Allow the highest decision-making body to make a unified decision on all environmental and development clearances



#### Types of Permits and Project Components Currently Eligible for Concurrent Review

- Determination of Public Convenience
- Tree Removal
- Major Encroachment Permit
- Development Agreements
- Subdivisions
- Streets Easements and Vacations

#### **Proposed Amendments add:**

Historic Preservation Permits and Historic Preservation Permit Amendments



### Why the Proposed Amendments?

- Currently, projects that require an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and have significant and unavoidable impacts require City Council action
- If such projects have an associated Historic Preservation Permit (or amendment), the Permit goes to Planning Directors Hearing <u>after</u> the City Council has taken action on the project, including certifying the EIR
- Proposed amendments eliminate the step of an added Planning Directors Hearing, after City Council has certified the EIR and approved all project entitlements
  - Provides an efficient, simplified process



#### Example: Gateway Tower Project

The project included: Site
Development Permit,
Tentative Map, Variance,
and HP Permit

-Without an EIR this process could have been approved by the Planning Director




However, the project
required an EIR with a
significant and
unavoidable impact and
was forwarded to Planning
Commission for
recommendation to City
Council



City Council certified the EIR and the remainder of the project: Site Development Permit, Tentative Map, and Variance

But, the HP Permit had to go to a Directors Hearing after City Council had already adopted the EIR and approval of all other entitlements



# What Changes for Historic Landmarks Commission Review?

- No changes
- The Historic Landmarks Commission maintains its authority to make recommendations on Historic Preservation Permits and Amendments, Landmarks, Districts, Design Review and Environmental Documents

  - Recommended approval
