



• Ensure best practices, maintain open communication, and develop policies and procedures providing the highest level of support to survivors

Redistricting

Phase I

- RFP for a consultant / vendor
- Establish a working group of Department subject matter experts
- Selection of a consultant / vendor

Current Position

Phase II

• Consultant / vendor analysis of: call volume and severity; response times; staffing and personnel deployment options; equity assurance; foot patrol options; technology and physical infrastructure; population density; geography. Will also take into account any changes in policy, such as through the Reimagining Community Safety process.

Phase III

- Cost analysis & acquisition of funding
- Development of a strategic implementation plan
- Redeployment/addition of Department personnel, as appropriate, to support the recommended model

Phase IV

- Deployment of recommended staffing model and redistricting
- Continued analysis by the working group for evaluation and review of implementation

Phase V

• Adjustment of staffing model and redistricting (if necessary)



Central Division Hotspot Area Map January 1, 2020 - February 28, 2021











Foothill Division Hotspot Area Map January 1, 2020 - February 28, 2021








Southern Division Hotspot Area January 1, 2020 - February 28, 2021







Western Division Hotspot Area January 1, 2020 - February 28, 2021







- \$701,000 in grant funds. Assignment staffed through overtime.





County-wide January

- 417 calls received
- 169 field visits
- 51 5150 holds

County-wide February

- 439 calls received
- 182 field visits
- 60 5150 holds

From SJPD only February

- 96 received
- 75 field visits
- 19 5150 holds





Program Comparisons

Mobile Crisis Assessment Team

- Specially trained officers and a mental health crisis workers respond to mental health calls for service.
- Team links people with mental illnesses to appropriate services or provides other effective and efficient responses.
- The most common approach is for the officers and crisis workers riding together in the same vehicle for an entire shift, while in other agencies the crisis worker meets officers at the scene, and they handle the call together.
- Teams respond throughout the City, specifically targeting areas with the greatest number of mental health calls.

CAHOOTS

(Crisis Assistance Helping Out On The Streets)

- A mental health crisis intervention program in Eugene, Oregon.
- Calls to 911 are related to addiction, disorientation, mental health crises, and homelessness but don't pose a danger to others are routed to CAHOOTS.
- Teams of two responders include a medic and a mental health crisis counselor.
- CAHOOTS does not handle calls involving violence, weapons, crimes, medical emergencies, or similarly dangerous situations.
