





- Overall, the Rape category declined by 9.4% from 2019 to 2020
- Domestic 261PC Rape increased by 140% from 2019 to 2020 and Domestic 220PC Assault with the Intent to Commit a felony Sex Crime increased by 400%
- The intersectionality tool increased the number of disclosures related to historical sexual assault perpetrated by the survivor's intimate partner.

Sexual Assault Bill of Rights PC 680.2

Cal. Pen. Code, § 680.2, subd. (a); (d).

Mandates that all local law enforcement agencies develop a card that explains
in a clear language the rights of sexual assault victims, and makes this card
accessible to each provider in its jurisdiction responsible for medical evidentiary
or physical examinations arising out of sexual assault.

History

 During the 2021 City Roadmap from COVID-19 to Recovery priority setting process, the City Council approved Councilmember Peralez's recommendation to move Councilmember Arenas' proposal to review and evaluate the City's implementation of the Sexual Assault Bill of Rights into the current Sexual Assault Response and Strategy Workplan

Create Applicable Duty Manual Sections

- Require compliance with the Sexual Assault Bill of Rights
- Require providing the CA Attorney General's Office *Marsy's Card and Resources* to survivors

Evaluate and Reformat Department Resource Cards

• Ensure Department resource cards furnish the most up-to-date and comprehensive information to survivors

Collaborate with Advocate and Community Partners

• Ensure best practices, maintain open communication, and develop policies and procedures providing the highest level of support to survivors

OBJECTIVE #1

Objective #1: Requiring officers to respond to and investigate all calls for service for domestic violence, child abuse, sexual assault, and human trafficking for potential high lethality and write a police report if a crime occurred.

Responsive Duty Manual Amendments

L 7307 Domestic Violence Reporting	Officers required to respond to, investigate, and document all calls for service involving domestic violence. Note: This section already contained the requirement and did not need to be amended.
L 7300 Domestic Violence	Modified to require officers to respond, investigate, and document all calls for service.
S 4313 Domestic Violence	Modified to interview survivors in a private setting and require investigation.
L 3024 Physical Child Abuse, Endangerment, or Neglect	Modified to require officers to respond to, investigate, and document all calls for service.

Standard Operating Procedure (SOP)

- Created after conversation with the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center's Pediatric Medical Team, Supervising Deputy District Attorney assigned to Sexual Assaults, and members of Department of Family and Children Services (DFCS)
- Assists members of SAIU in deciding which Pediatric SART exams to approve
- Expands upon SAIU's previous practice by adding value-based decision making in consultation with the Multi-Disciplinary Interview team
- Prioritizes open communication and ongoing collaboration
- Established a designated SAIU contact person for the Pediatric Medical Team

- To fulfill and implement the recommendations 1b and 1c from the Advocate Referrals Audit, the Department and the County will need to coordinate on resource card revisions and updates.
- Conversations are currently underway regarding best practices for county protocol

You Have the Right To:

- Seek an Emergency Protection Order to help keep you safe. Ask a law enforcement officer if you would like one.
- Seek a Civil Protection Order with the support of a sexual assault counselor OR at the Restraining Order Help Center at: 408-534-5709 or www.scscourt.org
- Request sex offender registry information from the prosecutor, if your assailant is convicted and required to register as a sex offender.
- Seek Financial Assistance from the California Victim Compensation Board (CalVCB) to cover the costs arising from your assault and the process for applying. Contact Victim Services Unit at:(408) 295-2656 or victims.ca.gov NOTE: You may have to take part in the criminal case to qualify for CalVCB.

You Have the Right To:

Have a Confidential Sexual Assault
 Counselor (Victim Advocate) AND a person of your choice present during any exam or investigative interview.

 Request a person of the same or opposite gender as you to be present in the room during any interview with law enforcement or the District Attorney.

You Have the Right To:

- Request in writing and receive a free copy of the initial crime report.
- Ask the status and results of the testing of all evidence related to your assault. For results contact the law enforcement agency.
- Know that DNA evidence on the body, clothing, and other items may last from 12 hours to 7 days. DNA and other evidence can breakdown over time due to exposure to heat, water, and other materials.
- Know the evidence related to your assault will be tested. By law, evidence should be taken to the Crime Lab within 20 days by Law Enforcement and tested within 120 days.
- Know that evidence related to your assault must be kept for 20 years, or until age 40 for victims under age 18. In Santa Clara County, the evidence will be kept indefinitely.





6.) Strategies to Increase Reporting





STRATEGIES TO INCREASE REPORTING

- Increase SAIU, FVU, and SVU capacity in the area of Crime and Intelligence Data Analytics to provide timely information to Community Based Organizations and the Crime Prevention Unit for education and prevention as resources allow.
- Increase capacity in the Department's Crime Prevention Unit as resources allow.
- Work more closely with all ethnic-based agencies (Emphasizing Asian Service Providers)
