Our community has made clear that the Google project cannot destabilize our communities: it must include affordable homes, protection for tenants, and good jobs so that renters, low-wage workers, and people of color can stay here and thrive. People with disabilities must also be represented; the incidence of disabling conditions is far higher in BIPOC communities so intersectionality is quite relevant.

One concern I have is that this new development should use principles of Universal Design, not merely check the boxes for ADA requirements. For example, Deaf people need wider walkways and hallways so they can walk side by side talking in ASL. Seating area design needs modification for people whose social conversation is in ASL. People with sensory processing differences (autistic, TBI survivors, etc.) need to have acoustically friendly environments and can be overwhelmed by some decorative patterns. There are architectural firms that specialize in Universal Design throughout the design process instead of having Disabled reviewers trying to catch problems with finalized designs and trying to get some kind of compromise.

For example, The Kelsey at Ayer Station is being designed with these principles because Disabled people are their target audience. But Disabled people should be able to live anywhere in the community--not just some special segregated complex that is too small to meet demand. People also have Disabled children, age into disability or acquire disabilities through accidents or illness. So someone living in the community should not have to move out of their home just because their new child has a disability, they get frail with age, or they have a stroke or accident. This is why all housing needs to be as widely accessible as possible.

I live in an affordable housing complex that technically meets ADA requirements, but as an Autistic person I find many areas of the building inaccessible and the level of noise in my apartment from the hallway is unacceptable. The common areas have hard finishes that are not designed to absorb sound, so there are harsh echoes in the lobby and community room. Sound travels and echoes in the hallway so loudly that I can't tell if people are fighting just out of sight from my peephole or halfway around the building down another corridor. If one person slams their door, mine rattles as though someone were trying to enter my apartment. Yet none of this violates ADA so the designers just used the materials they thought would be cheapest and most durable.

Our community has made clear that the Google project cannot destabilize our communities: it must include affordable homes, protection for tenants, and good jobs so that renters, low-wage workers, and people of color can stay here and thrive. People with disabilities must also be represented; the incidence of disabling conditions is far higher in BIPOC communities so intersectionality is quite relevant.

One concern I have is that this new development should use principles of Universal Design, not merely check the boxes for ADA requirements. For example, Deaf people need wider walkways and hallways so they can walk side by side talking in ASL. Seating area design needs modification for people whose social conversation is in ASL. People with sensory processing differences (autistic, TBI survivors, etc.) need to have acoustically friendly environments and can be overwhelmed by some decorative patterns. There are architectural firms that specialize in Universal Design throughout the design process instead of having Disabled reviewers trying to catch problems with finalized designs and trying to get some kind of compromise.

For example, The Kelsey at Ayer Station is being designed with these principles because Disabled people are their target audience. But Disabled people should be able to live anywhere in the community--not just some special segregated complex that is too small to meet demand. People also have Disabled children, age into disability or acquire disabilities through accidents or illness. So someone living in the community should not have to move out of their home just because their new child has a disability, they get frail with age, or they have a stroke or accident. This is why all housing needs to be as widely accessible as possible.

I live in an affordable housing complex that technically meets ADA requirements, but as an Autistic person I find many areas of the building inaccessible and the level of noise in my apartment from the hallway is unacceptable. The common areas have hard finishes that are not designed to absorb sound, so there are harsh echoes in the lobby and community room. Sound travels and echoes in the hallway so loudly that I can't tell if people are fighting just out of sight from my peephole or halfway around the building down another corridor. If one person slams their door, mine rattles as though someone were trying to enter my apartment. Yet none of this violates ADA so the designers just used the materials they thought would be cheapest and most durable.

For Google's commitment to put millions of dollars into a San José Community Fund to be truly meaningful, our community must have real power over where this money goes. Specifically:

- 1. We need to ensure this fund is centered on addressing racial justice and the root causes of displacement and strengthening our communities of color, so we can all stay in our homes, work at good jobs, and pursue our dreams.
- 2. We need the governing board of this Fund to be made up of grassroots San Jose leaders from Black, Brown, Indigenous and Asian communities, INCLUDING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES: individuals with firsthand experience living through, and fighting against racial injustice and displacement as well as the struggles of living in a world designed for able people.
- 3. Grassroots community leaders on the Fund's board must have decision-making power over strategic and annual plans and yearly budgets, and the authority to monitor and evaluate the project's impact.

Because the City of San Jose has not had an Office of Disability Affairs in many years, there is no oversight for projects or groups lacking Disabled input. This needs to stop now.
