Leadership is by far one of the greatest tools the youth can have, as the youth are the future of our city. By using the learned leadership skills and traits, these youth can create an even larger impact on the community around them.

What do you feel are some of the problems facing the youth of San Jose?

The largest problem I believe that the youth faces today is the digital divide. The digital divide refers to the gap between those able to benefit from the digital age by obtaining adequate access to technology, and those who are not. In other words, it means that the people that are able to afford more resources are able to learn and grow much more efficiently, while those with less are not so much. In this day and age, we are completely reliant on technology as our supplement for education. Because we are in the time-period of COVID-19, we have transitioned completely to technology with the extensive introduction of distance learning. And looking into the future, the majority of activities, both personal and professional, will gradually be shifted towards the online setting. Though this may sound appealing to most, this automatically creates a divide in all society. Because the financially sound are able to afford technological resources to aid the growth of their intellectual abilities through education, they are put at an advantage over those who cannot afford such devices. And these are the generations that are the future leaders, entrepreneurs, and change makers of tomorrow. If the youth of today are not sufficiently educated and provided the needed resources, the lives of the future will be impacted negatively severely.

What do you feel the priorities of the Youth Commission should be?

Building upon my response to the previous question, addressing the Digital Divide should be one of the top priorities of the commission. The last few years have seen exponential growth in the use of technology, both educationally and professionally. It is the medium through which students grow intellectually and financially. And in times of growing academic competition, people that have the ability to afford with the adequate technology and resources are able to excel, while those who are not, are not able to. And even after this high rise in the utilization of technology, about 95,000 individuals in the City of San Jose still don't have adequate access. Upon interviewing the previous D9 Youth Commissioner, Avi Singh, it came to my attention that he was also extremely passionate in alleviating the Digital Divide. He started a few programs, one of which works with Big Tech to anonymously donate devices to underprivileged youth. Though this program is in its initial stages, I certainly hope to carry it out further. Additionally, being in his YAC, he presented many ideas regarding the Digital Divide that can be converted into policy proposals. I hope to create policies on these ideas as well. In conclusion, education is the most important thing to youth, as it is what shapes their future ahead. And because of the large effect education has on youth, if adequate technological resources are not provided, their futures are at stake.

As the co-chair, I manage almost half a dozen events, many meetings, and some policy recommendations. Another trait I see in myself is public speaking. Being the co-chair of the YAC, I am in charge of running meetings, and creating new ideas/events and policies. I have also finalized and presented these ideas in front of city officials such as district councilmen and women. I have also been an ASB Representative for my class in Union Middle School. As an ASB Representative, I have presented several ideas for our school to the Union School District board. Additionally, I see listening and decision making in myself. I play on a travel basketball team, and have played on the UMS school basketball team as well. In this sport, I have to listen to and react upon callouts that the coach gives us, and make a series of quick decisions. Lastly, I see discipline. As a black belt in martial arts, obtaining such a rank was not easy. Taking over 6 years of my life, this was easily one of the most strenuous accomplishments I have had. And because of this, in the bigger picture, I have learned the real value of discipline, and the various positives it can amount to in life overall. These traits have become my personality. Without them, my confidence to pursue leadership would never have been found. And because of this confidence, I got involved in organizations such as the YAC, which focus on using such leadership to develop new ideas for the betterment of all youth. My willingness to apply this confidence does not stop there. I want to take it to greater levels, so a wider variety, and a larger number of youth are positively impacted.

What is your understanding of the purpose of the Commission?

In simple words, the Youth Commission works on a few motives: increasing civic engagement, motivating youth to use their voice in city government, and having a hand in creating a better, safe, and more sustainable San Jose. In a more elaborate description, the Youth Commission is the connection between the growing youth in San Jose and the San Jose City Board. This connection proves to be vital because the youth of today are the change-makers of tomorrow. And in a society where exceptional leadership is essential, it is more important than ever that all youth are provided with the appropriate resources and support for proper growth. Here is where the Youth Commission comes into play. Firstly, the Youth Commission spearheads the efforts of developing, presenting, and instituting policy recommendations. Policy recommendations are extremely important because they are a medium through which the youth of San Jose contribute to changing their atmosphere. Policies bring the direct change that they want to bring to the city. The Youth Commission also hosts events and fundraisers, and also brainstorm ideas that benefit the youth in our city. Some events that have been hosted before include, Viva Calles, and the Sharks event at the Camden Community Center. These events are what connects the city to the youth and inspire the youth to be more civically engaged, one of the main motives of the Commission.

Please list three issues facing the City that you feel the Commission should address.

Three of the largest issues facing the youth of the city are the digital divide, environmental pollution, and youth homelessness. The digital divide refers to the disparity between those able to afford adequate access to technology as compared to those who cannot. As I stated before, the last few years have seen exponential growth in the use of technology, both educationally and professionally, especially due to COVID-19. As everything in the future is shifting towards the digital ecosystem, technology is becoming more and more an inborn right, and it is our duty to fulfil that right. Next, pollution. Iqair.com states: "In 2018, San Jose AQI was 52 ("moderate") exceeding both US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) standards and the WHO annual target for PM2.5 by 2.4 µg/m3" The effect the particulate PM2.5 has on the bodies of youth is comparable to second-hand smoking. If youth are exposed to such high-levels of carcinogens this early on in their lifetime, they are bound to develop a lung disease in the near future. And considering that the majority of youth are very active (take part in various sports), the negative effects of this particulate are only magnified. It is important for the commission to take immediate action in addressing climate change, as in a research detailed by researchers, after 7 years, climate change will be irreversible. Lastly, there is youth homelessness. Though there were a considerable amount of homeless youth pre-pandemic, COVID-19 has created, and will create, an even larger youth homeless population due to the vast negative financial implications that will follow post-pandemic. Even though many memorandums were passed by the City to delay rent to avoid evictions, the downfall of the economy after these memorandums lose validity is imminent. Unfortunately, this means that many more youth will be homeless. As repeated many times before, youth are required to have their basic needs, such as housing and technology, to be adequately met so they can prosper in the future. And since the Youth Commission focuses on creating a better environment for all youth in San Jose, I feel that youth homelessness should be a top 3 priority.
