

Comparison of Government Forms in California

San José's charter is like a local "constitution" that defines how the City operates. The Charter sets the powers of the Mayor and the City Council, and guides the day-to-day work of City staff. The **Charter Review Commission** was created by City Council to discuss potential changes to the charter to improve accountability, representation and inclusion. This chart compares some of the major differences between the two primary forms of local government in the United States with San José's current form of government
