

### Legislative Update (State & Federal Funding)



Why a Quiet Zone here?

- 1. Low Train Speed
- 2. Low Train Volume
- 3. Low Traffic Volume
- 4. Only 1 active train track
- 5. Meets almost all federal requirements & qualifications for gz
  - (NSRT); 12,721.41 < 15,488
  - One location (7th/Jackson) requires modification ightarrow



Quiet Zone Risk Index (QZRI) < Nationwide Significant Risk Threshold

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


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Existing Quiet Zone under evaluation and safety improvements in progress

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### Pending Approval Early Fall

- UPRR approval of GO-88B and issue the Right of Entry for the interim plan at 7<sup>th</sup>/Jackson
- CPUC approval of GO-88B for the interim plan at 7<sup>th</sup>/Jackson
- 8/31 City Council to authorize CM to approve the Funding Agreements to cost share the UPRR track surface work

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### Required Work Late Fall

- UPRR upgrade the track
   surface with concrete
   panels at 7<sup>th</sup> St, Jackson St
   and 10<sup>th</sup> St
- City implement the 7<sup>th</sup>/Jackson interim plan
- City update all the signs and markings at the 14 rail crossing locations

#### Federal Legislation & Funding

- > In June, VTA applied for \$1.735B for BART Phase II through FTA's Expedited Project Delivery Pilot Program (EPD)
- > In July, City applied for \$3.5M in RAISE Planning Funding for Diridon Station Implementation Plan
- Infrastructure & Investment and Jobs Act Formula funding programs: Federal Transit & Highway Administration • Competitive funding programs: RAISE, INFRA, SMART (Strengthening Mobility & Revolutionizing Transportation), Bridge Discretionary Grant, Projects of National Significance, Safe Streets & Roads for All, Reconnecting Communities, PROTECT, EV Charging, Congestion Relief, Capital Investment Grants, Low/No-Emission Buses, Transit State of Good Repair, Stations Accessibility, Rail Vehicle Replacement SANJOSE





#### **State Legislation & Funding**

#### Budget included:

• Warm Springs Quiet Zone: \$8 million toward safety improvements for the railroad corridor that runs through downtown and the Japantown & Hensley neighborhoods

Full Transportation Budget

- \$4.2 billion in Proposition 1A HSR funds
- \$1 billion for transportation projects that support 2028 Olympics (LA)
- \$1 billion for priority transit & rail projects (TIRCP)
- \$500 million for grade separations & grade crossing improvements
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- \$500 million for active transportation program (ATP)
- \$407 million for zero-emission rail & transit equipment/infrastructure





#### **Regional Plan & Funding**

Plan Bay Area 2050 includes: ○ \$8.6B for HSR/Caltrain \$5.5B for Light rail modernization

Airport Connector: • VTA approved \$2.5M from Measure A funds in July • City will use to funds develop a Request for Proposals (RFP) for selecting a private sector partner to build and operate the connector as a public-private-partnership (P3) • The City has hired ARUP to assist staff in developing the RFP



### HGH-SPEED RAIL UPDATES

Environmental Impact Report (EIR) Draft EIR released April 2020 • City sent comment letter in June 2020 Final EIR to be released January 2022

Memorandum of Understanding Coming to Council in October Sets the framework for cooperative work going forward • Aligning Diridon Station access • Roles and responsibilities working towards grade separations
