Siting Policy's Stated Goals:

in August 20, 2021 Memorandum (Siting Policy)

- Aligning with Federal and State affirmatively furthering fair housing (AFFH) laws and obligations
- 2. Increasing affordable housing availability in opportunity areas*
- 3. Mitigating displacement of low-income residents
- 4. Creating a Siting Policy that is easily administered by City staff and understood by developers

Two Critical Flaws in Current Draft of Siting Policy

- Does not acknowledge different impacts of supportive vs.
 affordable housing to surrounding community and does not distribute
 them evenly throughout San José.
- 2. Does not drive development into the 78% of census block areas with <u>zero</u> affordable / supportive housing and continues to allow over-concentration within certain census blocks / neighborhoods.

Impact of Supportive vs. Affordable

Flaw 1:

Does not acknowledge different impacts of supportive vs. affordable housing to the surrounding community.

SOLUTION

Distinguish between supportive and affordable housing so that supportive housing can be equitably distributed.




Impact of Supportive vs. Affordable

Flaw 1:


Does not acknowledge different impacts of supportive vs. affordable housing to the surrounding community.

SOLUTION

Distinguish between supportive and affordable housing so that supportive housing can be equitably distributed.



Note: All districts have approximately the same total population count.



Prioritize Development

Flaw 2:


Not aggressive enough.

Continues to allow overconcentration within certain census blocks.

SOLUTION

Direct funding to census blocks / neighborhoods with <u>no</u> affordable / supportive housing units.

Council should direct Housing to amend the policy to include these changes *prior* to approval:

1. Recognize Impacts & Ensure Even Distribution:

Acknowledge different impacts of affordable vs. supportive housing to surrounding neighborhoods. Support successful outcomes for residents and their surrounding neighbors.

2. Prioritize Development:

Prioritize development in the 78% of the City's census blocks that lack <u>any</u> affordable / supportive housing.
