2020-2021 Neighborhoods Commission Annual Report

1. INTRODUCTION

This report covers the activities of the San José Neighborhoods Commission (NC) from July 2020 through June 2021. The NC was unable to meet in person and publicly from July 2020 to June 2021 the commission met by Zoom meetings from April 2020 until June 2021.

The purpose of the report is to inform the Mayor and City Council of the tasks undertaken by the NC, what was accomplished, the lessons learned, and recommendations to the Council. Due to the unusual circumstances of COVID-19 restrictions on meeting publicly, accomplishments of the Neighborhoods Commission were greatly reduced. The Neighborhoods Commission was unable to fill vacant positions created by resignations. As a result, a quorum was not able to be attained from November 2020 until March 2021.

As defined in San José City Ordinance No. 29297, the NC has the functions, powers, and duties to study, review, and evaluate and make recommendations to the Council regarding issues, policies, and programs affecting the quality of life in San José neighborhoods focusing on neighborhood safety, transportation, and code enforcement. The NC also advises and makes recommendations to the Council regarding annual budget priorities.

Additionally, City of San José Council Resolution No. 78016, adopted December 13, 2016 designated the NC as the San José City's Measure B ¼-cent Sales Tax independent citizen's oversight committee. The Neighborhoods Commission Independent Citizens Oversight Committee (Oversight Committee) will analyze the Measure B ¼-cent Sales Tax data provided by the City and produce an annual report containing an evaluation of the proposed budget allocations with the actual expenditure, and the resultant outcome and submit that report to the City Council. District Commissioners were unable to meet with associations and neighborhood leadership groups. The result was feedback from those neighborhood associations and leadership groups were unable to be gathered and conveyed to the Neighborhoods Commission as a whole.

2. <u>NC COMMISSIONERS</u>

A list of the NC Commissioners serving during 2020-2021 is provided in Table 2-1. Jim Carter (D6) served as chair and Nicole Edraos (D8) served as vice chair during this period. The commissioners were selected by district caucuses (with the exception of those appointed to fill vacated seats until the next caucus) and represent their district's views and concerns. The commissioner's backgrounds provide a broad spectrum of experience in neighborhood affairs complemented by experience in different occupational areas, including management, finance, and technical.

3. NC WORK PLAN

The goals and objectives of the NC are defined by the NC charter. The NC is advisory to the City Council regarding San José neighborhoods.

The Neighborhoods Commission was unable to create an annual work plan, which was to be approved by Neighborhood Services and Education Committee. The 2019-2020 work plan was not completed due to COVID-19 and the inability of the Commission to establish a quorum in order to conduct business from March 2020 to April 2021.

The NC meets 10 times per year, 2 hours each meeting. The effective time to address work plan topics/issues is 1 to 1.5 hours per meeting (10—15 hours per year). The NC uses ad-hoc committees as a viable method for investigating and researching work plan item development and providing the commission with the results. Per San José City's Policy 0-4, ad-hoc committees are allowed for specific short-term tasks or projects with a narrow scope and shall not last longer than six months. The purpose of an ad-hoc is defined, and that purpose is within the "functions, powers, and duties" of the Commission.

4 MEASURE B ¼-CENT SALES TAX OVERSIGHT

The Neighborhoods Commission Independent Citizens Oversight Committee was authorized as a result of the San José City's Measure B ¼-cent Sales Tax ballot measure approved by the voters on June 7, 2016. The measure required Independent Citizens Oversight with public review of spending, and all revenues controlled locally.

City of San José Council Resolution No. 78016, adopted December 13, 2016, designated the NC of the City of San José as the local sales tax independent citizens oversight committee.

Each year, for the life of the Measure B ¼-Cent Sales Tax, the Oversight Committee will review:

- Revenue resulting from the measure;
- Those areas of the San José annual budget impacted by the measure; and
- Measure B ¼-cent Sales Tax independently audited sales tax revenue expenditure data provided by the San José City Manager's Office.

The Oversight Committee will analyze the data provided by the City and produce an annual report with a timeline defined by the City, containing an evaluation of the proposed budget allocations with the actual expenditure, and the resultant outcome and submit that report to the City Council. The following is a summary of the reported Oversight Committee findings and recommendations for FY 2019-2020 Measure B ¼-Cent Sales Tax revenues and allocations submitted to the Mayor and Council. The findings, observations/comments, and recommendations are provided in the Oversight Committee report submitted to the Mayor and Council.

- **4.1 FY 2019-2020 Findings.** The revenues reported for FY 2019-2020 represent the fourth year of Measure B implementation and were for 12 months. The City Manager's Office provided the Measure B ¼-Cent Sales Tax revenues and expenditures for FY 2019-2020. The findings in this report as well as observations/comments, and recommendations are based on the Measure B data provided by the City Manager's Office and was submitted to the Mayor and Council and cover the period from 7/1/2019 to 6/30/2020.
- **4.2 FY 2019-2020 Revenues.** San José City's 2016 Measure B ¼-Cent Sales Tax revenues received for FY 2018-2019 were \$43,150,275. The revenues were expended for each of the Measure B categories as detailed in Table 4-1.
