SUBJECT:AMENDMENT TO THE AGREEMENT WITH NELSON\NYGAARD CONSULTING
ASSOCIATES, INC. FOR THE EMERGING MOBILITY ACTION PLAN

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a resolution authorizing the City Manager negotiate and execute an amendment to the City's agreement with Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, Inc. for the San José Emerging Mobility Action Plan to an amount not to exceed \$663,040.10.

BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

On September 22, 2020, the City Council authorized the City Manager to enter into an agreement with Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, Inc for a maximum amount of \$586,994 to develop a San José Emerging Mobility Action Plan. Because equity is centered in this community-based planning effort, the scope of work includes contextual research on historical and existing inequities, especially those that are transportation-related; the creation of an equity task force to facilitate community engagement, particularly in the City's historically underserved neighborhoods; surveys, focus groups, and conversations with the community and with technical experts to determine where and how emerging mobility services and the city's policies and programs might be molded to meet local needs; and finally identifying specific strategies the City should pursue to expand mobility options and access to opportunities to all.

Staff is recommending that the City add \$76,046 to the agreement with Nelson/Nygaard to carry out more extensive community engagement in the final round of outreach on the draft plan. It would also allow the consultant to build out several of the top recommendations in the plan to ready those concepts for grant applications to potential funders. This additional work would include coordinating and possibly collaborating with other City departments, such as the Office of Racial Equity and Housing Department, on common interests. The additional work would be paid for by a Caltrans Sustainable Communities grant: \$67,324 from the state and a 11.47% match of \$8,722 from the City; the same grant that is currently funding Nelson/Nygaard's work on this project. If the contract is not increased, the City will not be able to carry out this additional work, nor will it be able to utilize the full grant awarded to the City for this project.
