<u>Motion</u>: Councilmember David Cohen moved to approve the May 5, 2023 joint memorandum coauthored by Councilmember Cohen and Mayor Mahan. This motion was seconded by Councilmember Pam Foley.

<u>Friendly Amendment</u>: Councilmember Arjun Batra requested to include exploration into alternative energy sources for the development's proposed gas and diesel generators.

The maker of the motion, Councilmember David Cohen declined to include this change due to the necessity of reliable back-up energy for data centers. Councilmember Cohen also spoke on the challenge of powering data centers through on-site solar panels alone, the commitment made by Stack Infrastructure to source energy from 100% renewable sources for anything used on site, and the transformation of the top floor parking into a space for solar panels upon the end of construction.

<u>Action</u>: On a call to the question, the May 5, 2023 joint memorandum co-authored by Councilmember Cohen and Mayor Mahan was approved to:

Approve staff recommendation with the following additional direction:

- 1. Direct the Departments of Transportation and Public Works to explore a green stormwater infrastructure (bioretention) pilot as part of the bike lane upgrade along Trade Zone Blvd. Work shall be coordinated with Stack Infrastructure on any implementation of the pilot.
- 2. Stack Infrastructure will pay the required tree in-lieu mitigation fees (\$326K) at the time of issuance of the first building permit.
- 3. Stack Infrastructure will make an additional voluntary tree mitigation payment of \$40,000, to be deposited in the District 4 One Thousand Tree Project fund at the time of the issuance of the first building permit.
- 4. Stack Infrastructure will evaluate the site's parking needs after completion of construction to determine the feasibility of converting the top floor of the parking garage to a combination of solar installation and green roofing.

As per Staff Recommendation, (b) **Ordinance No. 30908** was passed for publication and (a) **Resolution No. RES2023-144**, (c) **Resolution No. RES2023-145**, and (d) **Resolution No. RES2023-146** were adopted. (11-0.)

• Open Forum

- 1. Alex Eulenberg spoke on the termination of the Local Emergency for COVID Response to be heard during the May 16, 2023 City Council meeting and requested the removal of the COVID-19 Vaccine requirement for City employment.
- 2. Spencer Hammer expressed interest in San José developing more Sister Cities relationships and spoke on the potential on developing a sister city relationship with a city in Africa.
- 3. Blair Beekman spoke on safety during Council Committee meetings and an increased hostility by the Police Department during Cinco de Mayo.
- 4. Paul Soto described the actions of the Police Department on Cinco de Mayo as a racist act of aggression and expressed the need for communication on the issue.
