Councilmember Maya Esparza pulled this item to ask questions on what specific steps city staff will take in working with the developer on developing the city electric utility and asked whether the pro forma and evaluation includes future impacts to the general fund. Director, San Jose Clean Energy, Lori Mitchell responded to questions.

(a) Adopt a resolution authorizing the Director of Public Works to: (1) Decide any timely bid protests, including any issues of bidder responsiveness or responsibility; (2) Make the City's final determination as to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder; (3) Award and execute two contracts for the construction of the Mt. Pleasant and Silver Creek Projects, to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder on each Project, in an amount not to exceed \$1,750,000 for each Project, in a total amount for both Projects not to exceed \$3,500,000; and (4) Establish a construction contingency of 10% of the amount of the construction contracts for each Project. Pleasant and Silver Creek High Schools during the second

City Manager Jennifer Maguire provided a verbal report on the achievements of the City's Climate Action Plan, Climate Smart San Jose and included a number of milestones achieved over the past year: Approving a goal of being carbon neutral by 2030; successfully applying to take apart of the first ever U.S. Department of energy, installing 33 new miles of bike lanes, launching solar access program, adding two new renewable energy projects to the grid. She thanked community partners and the following City departments: Environmental Services; Community Energy; Transportation; Planning, Building, Code Enforcement; Housing; Public Works; Parks, Recreation, and Neighborhood Services; Economic Development and Cultural Affairs; and the Airport.

#### Actions Related to Increasing Equitable Representation on the Housing and Community Development Commission.

(a) Approve an ordinance amending Part 28 of Chapter 2.08 of Title 2 of the San José Municipal Code, titled "Housing and Community Development Commission" to: (1) Increase the total number of members from 13 to 14; (2) Add one new designated member seat for a person with lived experience with homelessness; (3) Provide that the Mayor nominate (in the short-term) the Lived Experience with Homelessness Commissioner for submission to City Council for formal appointment; and (4) Commencing in Fiscal Year 2022-2023, provide a monthly stipend in the amount of

\$200 for the Lived Experience with Homelessness Commissioner on the Housing and Community Development Commission, dependent on attending a monthly meeting.
(b) Direct the Housing Department to help recruit interested applicants for the new Lived Experience with Homelessness Commissioner seat and, upon appointment, provide the necessary resources and support for the new Commissioner to reduce barriers to participation. CEQA: Not a Project, File No. PP17-008, General Procedure and Policy Making resulting in no changes to the physical environment. (Housing) [Deferred from 3/29/2022 - Item 8.1 (22-401)]

Housing Department's Director Jacky Morales-Ferrand, Mayor's Office for Economic Opportunity Chief of Staff Jin Kim, and City Attorney's Office Deputy City Attorney Chris Alexander provided the presentation and responded to questions.

<u>Public Comments</u>: Blair Beekman; Alex Shoor (Catalyze SV); Martha O'Connell; Godzilla; and Call-In User\_1 offered public comments.

<u>Action</u>: Upon motion by Councilmember Raul Peralez, seconded by Councilmember Maya Esparza, and carried unanimously, **Ordinance No. 30757** was passed for publication and the April 15, 2022 memorandum authored by Councilmember Raul Peralez was approved to accept staff recommendations with the following: (1) amend the ordinance language to permit the Mayor and City Council to appoint, if needed, an alternate in addition to a Lived Experience Homelessness Commissioner, and (2) direct the City Manager to explore implementing a similar criteria of lived homelessness experience for other relevant city boards and commissions. (11-0.)

#### 22-575 Proposed Changes to the Spending Priorities and Percentage Allocations Measure E Real Property Transfer Taxes.

(a) Hold the second of two public hearings regarding proposed changes to the spending priorities and percentage allocations of real property transfer tax revenues as described under Section 22 of City Council Policy 1-18. (b) Accept the staff report and adopt a resolution amending Council Policy 1-18, Operating Budget and Capital Improvement Program Policy, to make the following changes to the spending priorities and percentage allocations of real property transfer tax revenue set forth under Section 22, Real Property Transfer Tax Revenues, to modify the category names and percentage allocations to: (1) 40% for creation of new affordable housing for extremely low-income households; (2) 30% for creation of new affordable housing for moderate-income households; (4) 10% for homeless prevention and rental assistance; and (5) 15% for homeless support programs including shelter construction and operations.

Housing Department's Director Jacky Morales-Ferrand and the City Manager's Office Budget Director Jim Shannon provided the presentation and responded to questions.

Public Comments: Public comments were heard during the April 12, 2022 City Council meeting.

<u>Motion</u>: Mayor Sam Liccardo moved to approve the April 8, 2022 memorandum co-authored by Liccardo, Peralez, Davis, Foley, and Mahan. This motion was seconded by Councilmember Raul Peralez.

<u>Friendly Amendment:</u> Councilmember Maya Esparza requested that any residual dollars in Category (5), which are identified in the City Manager's Annual Report, with computation of a 5-year forecast, be made eligible for homeless prevention and rental assistance expenses. This amendment was accepted by Mayor Sam Liccardo.

<u>Action</u>: On a call to the question, the joint April 8, 2022 memorandum co-authored by Mayor Sam Liccardo and Councilmembers Raul Peralez, Dev Davis, Pam Foley, and Matt Mahan was approved to:

(1) Accept staff recommendations

(2) Decline assigning a specific minimum duration for deed restrictions on accessory dwelling units (ADUs) – currently proposed at 20 years across all housing identified in the category "Creation of New Affordable Housing for Moderate-Income Households"- to allow staff to explore appropriate affordability restrictions through outreach and research, until staff has an opportunity to return to Council with a proposed ADU financing program.

Staff's recommendation was approved with the amendment to recommendation (i) to read: "15% for primarily for homeless support programs, shelter construction and operations, that may include, but is not limited to, case management, outreach teams, encampment services, safe parking, homeless shelters and interim housing construction and operations."

In addition, should the City Manager's Five-Year General Fund Forecast determine that sufficient resources are available to support the aforementioned programs in accordance with prior City Council direction over the five-year forecast horizon, any residual funds are eligible for homelessness prevention and rental assistance expenses.

Per Staff recommendations, **Resolution No. 80472** was adopted. (11-0.)
