I'd like to suggest that DOT, PNRS, and City Council should adopt a policy around retention, maintenance, and usage (or qualifications for disposal) of former railroad rights-of-way. And that the City should hold off on entertaining these kinds of sales until such a policy is in place.

Some other reasons to consider holding onto this parcel instead of selling it:

- Even if this ROW isn't in the trails master plan, maybe it should be. It doesn't need to be high priority, but we could use more trails everywhere.
- Trails are a nice alternative to walking/biking alongside the street. The trail segment doesn't have to be long to be useful.
- Trails through industrial parks can be attractive to employees and employers, and can be a
 benefit to everyone in the area.
- Trails crossing roads at mid-block can be safer and more connected than trails crossing roads at four-way intersections. So we shouldn't reject this as a future trail because of the mid-block crossings.
- Even if we don't develop a trail, that strip of land can be used as a location for tree mitigation
 from industrial redevelopments in the immediate area. And in general can be useful as a
 permeable green surface in a pavement-heavy industrial area.
- If UPPR ever abandons the adjacent Warm Springs line, it could make for an extensive trail. And the parcel being considered today could be used as a trailhead.

I also believe that the City shouldn't sell any land, it should charge rent, with options to cancel the lease if it gives a few years notice that it is planning a project that will use that parcel. I think this could be an appropriate compromise for the parcel being considered today.
