Re: Recommendation for Enhanced Policies on Prolonged Residential Construction Projects to Mitigate Community Impacts – Case Reference: 1163 Fairview Ave, San José, CA 95125

Dear Honorable Members of the City Council,

I am writing as a concerned resident of San José to bring to your attention an ongoing issue with a residential construction project that exemplifies broader systemic challenges in our city's permitting and enforcement processes. Specifically, I have recently become acquainted with the property owner and the general contractor associated with a single-family home development at 1163 Fairview Ave, which has now exceeded nearly 10 years in duration without substantial completion. This property is next door to my home. This protracted timeline has not only resulted in a multi-year visual blight and neighborhood disruption but also raises significant questions about compliance with local building codes and the adequacy of current oversight mechanisms.

While I appreciate the City's efforts to streamline permitting through initiatives like the <u>SJPermits.org</u> online portal and the Best Prepared

Designer Program, which aim to expedite approvals. The lack of robust enforcement for inactive or stalled sites remains a critical gap. Under the California Building Code (CBC) Section 105.5, as adopted by San José Municipal Code (SJMC) Title 24, building permits are generally valid for 180 days from issuance, with extensions possible upon request to the Development Services Call Center. However, prolonged inactivity, such as the nearly 10 years observed here, can lead to automatic expiration, necessitating re-application and potential revocation if work ceases without notification. In this instance, neither the owner nor the contractor has demonstrated consistent progress or follow-through as outlined in their approved plans, despite the City's prior awareness of related complaints. Another unfortunate process has been what the owner at 1163 Fairview Ave has done: perform just enough work, every 4-6 months to keep the project from being considered abandoned; an obvious effort to game the rules.

This situation not only contravenes the spirit of SJMC Chapter 1.08 (Code Enforcement), which empowers the City to abate public nuisances—including unsafe, unsightly, or abandoned construction sites through administrative citations, fines (up to \$1,000 per day for ongoing violations), or even misdemeanor charges under California Penal Code Section 372—it also imposes undue burdens on surrounding residents. Prolonged projects contribute to environmental hazards (e.g., erosion, debris accumulation), diminished property values, and aesthetic degradation, all of which undermine San José's commitment to high-quality urban living as outlined in the Envision 2040 General Plan.

To prevent such occurrences and foster accountability, I respectfully urge the City Council to consider the following policy enhancements:

- Mandatory Progress Reporting: Require quarterly status updates for residential projects exceeding 12 months, with automatic permit suspension for non-compliance, aligned with CBC guidelines.
- Inactivity Thresholds and Revocation Protocols: Formalize a 24month inactivity limit before initiating revocation proceedings, coupled with streamlined resident reporting via an expanded Code Enforcement Services portal (accessible at <u>sanjoseca.gov/</u> <u>codeenforcement</u>).

- Community Impact Assessments: Integrate nuisance abatement fees into permit fees for high-risk projects, with funds allocated to neighborhood revitalization efforts.
- Enhanced Oversight Collaboration: Partner with the Santa Clara County Department of Planning and Development for joint inspections on stalled sites, ensuring swift resolution.
- 5. Overall project time limit.

I am confident that implementing these measures would not only resolve cases like the one at 1163 Fairview Avenue but also safeguard our community's livability and economic vitality — including but not limited to preserving and enhancing property tax revenues. The Economic and Psychological Toll of Crime in California: A Two-Page Synopsis

The costs of crime are far-reaching, extending well beyond the immediate loss of property or physical injury. They impose a significant burden on individuals, communities, and the state as a whole, encompassing both tangible economic costs and devastating psychological impacts. In California, a state with a population of nearly 40 million, these costs are immense and multifaceted. This synopsis outlines the estimated economic and psychological costs of various crimes, with a specific focus on those affecting the everyday lives of Californians.

Economic Costs

The economic costs of crime can be broken down into three main categories: costs to victims, costs to the criminal justice system, and broader societal costs.

1. Costs to Victims:

This is the most direct and personal economic impact. It includes:

- Property Loss and Damage: This is a key component for crimes like car theft, burglary, and bicycle theft. For example, the average value of property stolen during a home burglary in the U.S. is estimated to be over \$2,600. For car theft, while the value of the vehicle is the most obvious loss, it's not the only one. Victims also face the cost of rental cars, increased insurance premiums, and the loss of personal items left inside the vehicle. California is one of the states with the highest rates of auto theft, and while the recovery rate for stolen cars is relatively high, the hassle and financial burden on the victims remain.
- Loss to Businesses from Smash-and-Grab Robberies: The economic impact of "smash-and-grab" robberies extends well beyond the value of the stolen merchandise. In California, these organized retail crimes have become a significant problem. While it's difficult to pinpoint an "average" cost for each incident due to the wide range in value of stolen goods, the total impact is staggering. A single incident can result in tens of thousands of dollars in losses from stolen goods alone, but the real costs are much higher. Businesses must also pay for the repair of damaged property, such as smashed windows and display cases. They face skyrocketing insurance premiums, lost sales from temporary closures, and the need to invest in costly security measures. This economic pressure can even lead to store closures, leaving communities with fewer services and fewer jobs.

- Medical Expenses: Assault, robbery, and other violent crimes can result in significant
 medical bills for physical injuries, ranging from emergency room visits to long-term
 rehabilitation. The financial toll of these crimes is staggering. For instance, the costs of a
 single violent crime, such as a robbery, can exceed \$19,000 when factoring in medical
 expenses, lost wages, and pain and suffering.
- Lost Wages and Productivity: Victims of crime often miss work to deal with the
 aftermath, including reporting the crime, meeting with law enforcement, and attending
 court proceedings. The psychological distress can also lead to long-term unemployment
 or reduced productivity.

2. Costs to the Criminal Justice System:

This represents the taxpayer burden of crime. It includes:

- Law Enforcement: The costs of police patrols, investigations, and responding to crime calls are substantial. In California, a significant portion of local government budgets is allocated to police protection. To combat organized retail theft, for example, California has awarded over \$267 million in grants to local law enforcement agencies for increased patrols and surveillance.
- Judicial and Legal Services: Every crime that is reported and prosecuted incurs costs for the courts, public defenders, prosecutors, and all associated legal staff.
- Corrections and Incarceration: California has one of the highest per capita spending
 rates on corrections in the nation. The costs of operating prisons, jails, and parole and
 probation systems are enormous, and they are directly linked to the number of crimes
 committed.

3. Broader Societal Costs:

These are the indirect economic impacts that affect the entire community.

- Decreased Property Values: Neighborhoods with higher crime rates often see a
 decline in property values, impacting homeowners and the overall tax base.
- Eroding Public Trust and Safety: The constant threat of crime, including the visible and brazen nature of smash-and-grabs, erodes public trust and makes people feel unsafe. This can lead to reduced foot traffic in commercial areas, which hurts local businesses and slows economic growth.
- Lost Tourism and Business: High-profile crime can deter tourism and new business
 development, slowing economic growth. A recent study estimated the cost of intimate
 partner violence alone in California to be over \$73 billion in 2022, a figure that includes
 lost productivity, healthcare costs, and criminal justice spending, which is a significant
 portion of the state's budget.

Psychological Costs

While the economic costs can be quantified, the psychological impacts of crime are often immeasurable and can be far more devastating. The effects are not limited to violent crimes; property crimes also have a profound psychological toll.

- Emotional Trauma and Distress: Victims of crime frequently experience a range of
 emotions, including fear, anger, anxiety, and a profound sense of violation. This is
 especially true for crimes that invade one's personal space, such as burglary, or for
 employees who witness violent retail crimes.
- Loss of Safety and Security: Crime shatters a person's sense of safety, both in their own home and in their community. This fear can lead to long-term changes in behavior, such as avoiding certain public spaces or constantly being on guard. One study found that two-thirds of California crime victims reported experiencing anxiety, stress, and difficulty sleeping.
- Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD): Victims of violent crimes like assault and robbery are at a high risk of developing PTSD, which can lead to flashbacks, nightmares, and severe anxiety. But even victims of non-violent crimes, such as a home burglary or witnessing a smash-and-grab, can experience symptoms of PTSD.
- Impact on Social and Family Life: The psychological effects of crime can strain relationships with friends and family. A victim may become withdrawn, irritable, or unable to participate in activities they once enjoyed.
- Erosion of Trust: Crime, particularly in a community setting, can erode trust in neighbors, law enforcement, and the justice system itself. This can weaken community bonds and make it more difficult for people to work together to solve problems.

We recognize a myriad of other groups of individuals to bring about awareness Such as:

- National Crime Victims' Rights Week: During this week in April, events and ceremonies are held in communities to honor victims and raise awareness about victims' rights and services. The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services supports these efforts across the state.
- Advocacy and rallies: Local groups advocating for crime victims' services often hold rallies, sometimes at San Jose City Hall, to bring awareness to their cause.
- Vigils for specific tragedies: After major crimes, such as the 2021 VTA shooting,
 the city has organized vigils to mourn victims and provide a space for grieving.

 Victim assistance programs: The San Jose Police Department and other local agencies provide resources and assistance year-round to help victims navigate the legal system and find support.

I would respectfully request that an item be placed on a future agenda to discuss the possibility of enacting a day of recognition and awareness for victims of crime. I would also like to suggest that there be a specific committee, if one does not already exist, that meets on a quarterly basis to take public input concerning trends in crime, lack of response, Ideas that are working, and programs that are not working. I believe this would give a voice to a group of people who are often ignored. Though there are specific events that help such as vigils and The national crime victims rights week. San Jose was recently acknowledged as being one of the safest big cities in America. Such a Day of recognition and a quarterly committee could help raise even more awareness for people who struggle with the economic, emotional, physical, and social effects of crime.
