Adopt a resolution authorizing the Housing Director, or his designee, to negotiate and execute new Emergency Interim Housing program grant agreements with the following nonprofit service provider: (a) HomeFirst Services of Santa Clara County (Emergency Interim Housing site: Cherry) in an amount not to exceed \$3,300,000, retroactive from October 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026; and

(b) HomeFirst Services of Santa Clara County (Emergency Interim Housing site: Cerone) in an amount not to exceed \$4,100,000, retroactive from October 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026. ### 4. PUBLIC SAFETY SERVICES

### 4.1 Ordinance Prohibiting Law Enforcement Officers from Concealing their Identities in the City of San José.

Approve an ordinance of the City of San José adding a new Chapter 10.54 to Title 10 of the San José Municipal Code requiring all law enforcement officers operating in the City of San José to wear clearly visible identification and prohibiting the use of face coverings that obscure identity during public interaction, with limited exceptions.

CEQA: Not a Project, File No. PP17-008, General Procedure and Policy Making resulting in no changes to the physical environment. (City Attorney)

Mayor Matt Mahan announced that public comments for Items 3.9 and 4.1 would be limited to 90 seconds per speaker, heard concurrently at 4:00 p.m., and voted on separately, in accordance with the motion made during Orders of the Day.

Matt Loesch, Director, Public Works Department, responded to questions from Council.

- (3) adopting local amendments regarding certain structural design requirements, fire sprinkler regulations, and other building requirements.
