BRIDGING THE GAP WITH RESILIENCE CORPS

San José's resources are stretched thin, but that won't stop us from caring for our parks. Thanks to the Resilience Corps, we're bridging a gap in park maintenance while building the workforce of tomorrow.

The Resilience Corps provides hands-on experience for young adults while enhancing our parks. Corpsmembers help repair amenities, maintain trails, and reduce wildfire risks—delivering real value to our community. Since launching in 2021, we've hired over 30 participants into full-time roles with benefits and retirement. It's a win-win for our parks and our future workforce.

■ RANGERS BRING NATURE TO YOU

Park Rangers hosted nearly 50 family-friendly events, connecting over 3,000 people with nature and public service. From "Touch a Truck" to "Many Hats of a Ranger," these programs showcase how Park Rangers protect nature while inspiring youth to pursue a fulfilling career.

THE POLLINATOR MOVEMENT IS BLOOMING

What started as a way to engage volunteers has grown into a community-led movement to support biodiversity. Since 2022, we've supported volunteers as they planned and installed 33 native gardens—now flourishing in 15% of San José's parks.

These gardens support local pollinators, conserve water, and build community pride. At Kirk Park, one inspired volunteer is now mentoring neighbors to create pollinator gardens in their communities. It's proof that small actions can take root and grow into positive change for people and the planet.



WHERE EVERY CHILD CAN LEARN > TO SWIM (AND SO MUCH MORE)

Many families in San José don't have pools, but every child deserves the chance to learn how to swim. That's why we offer affordable \$10 swim lessons and free swim days at all of our community pools, making this life-saving skill accessible to everyone.

In addition, our afterschool and summer camps provide safe, enriching spaces for children to learn, grow, and connect. These programs boost outcomes and serve as a lifeline for working families. These programs help parents stay employed and pursue their passions while their children thrive.

COMMUNITY SPACES FOR CULTURE AND CONNECTION

San José's community centers are trusted spaces where residents connect, learn, and belong.

Through vibrant celebrations such as Día de los Muertos, Lunar New Year, and Nowruz, our centers honor the rich cultural fabric of our city and the neighborhoods they serve. These events foster a sense of pride and connection, making everyone feel at home.

Older adults especially thrive in these spaces. Many seniors come for healthy, affordable meals offered by our Senior Nutrition Program and stay for the friendships and support they find there. Whether it's sharing a hot meal, joining a fitness class, or catching up with friends, our community centers help older adults stay active, connected, and cared for.

Time in nature boosts health and happiness, but too often, barriers such as transportation or language keep families indoors. At Emma Prusch Farm Park, we're overcoming those barriers.

In a partnership led by Santa Clara County Public Health's Juntos Initiative, the San José Park Rangers and Veggielution helped connect families to the outdoors, healthy food, and each other. The result? A welcoming and inclusive experience that makes outdoor spaces a joyful part of daily life.



MAKING HAPPY HOLLOW PARK & ZOO A PLACE FOR EVERY FAMILY

Happy Hollow Park & Zoo's Access for All program ensures that more San José families can experience nature through play. For the price of about one regular admission, a family of four can enjoy a full day at the park and zoo.

The program has doubled in size for two straight years, growing from 3,115 applications and 12,891 tickets in 2023-2024 to 6,129 applications and 24,444 tickets in 2024-2025—representing more than \$342,000 in community savings.



4 A SAFE SPACE FOR TEENS

San José's Teen Centers offer emotional refuge and fun for teens navigating one of life's toughest stages. Each year, these welcoming, supervised spaces support teens with building friendships, exploring interests, and simply being themselves.

Beyond teen centers, we also offer teen sports leagues including flag football, basketball, volleyball, and futsal, which give youth the chance to stay active and compete in a supportive environment. Thanks to scholarships, 100% of teens enrolled in last year's leagues were able to participate at no cost.

PLAY, EXPLORE, BELONG

Through Viva Parks, Viva CalleSJ, and partnerships with groups like Trust for Public Land and Reimagining the Civic Commons, San José is reimagining public space. Placemaking in parks brings together residents across cultures, neighborhoods, and generations.

Yoga and movie nights at St. James Park are helping reshape its reputation, and with a future Levitt Pavilion on the horizon, the park is coming alive again.

EMPOWERING NEIGHBORHOODS

Through a new Neighborhood Engagement Model, BeautifySJ is equipping residents with tools and connections to create cleaner, safer neighborhoods.

The 2024 Neighborhoods Conference drew over 250 residents to workshops on safety, grants, and civic engagement. Since then, quarterly forums have strengthened relationships between neighbors and City staff, building a more responsive and resilient community.

As we look ahead, we're laying the foundation for the future of San José's parks and recreation system, which we know must be rooted in equity and collaboration.

We will continue to strengthen partnerships with residents, nonprofits, and community leaders to ensure every neighborhood has access to safe, welcoming public spaces and high-quality programs.

Our challenges are real: \$554 million in aging infrastructure, limited maintenance staffing, and growing demand for services. But as always, we'll face them with creativity, resilience, and a commitment to putting community at the center.

Next year, we'll engage San José residents in shaping a new Parks and Recreation Master Plan to better understand needs, identify gaps, and build a shared vision. The result will be a plan that contains the tools to drive real policy changes to improve the everyday experience of people in our parks and programs.
